This complex consists of 4 nearly identical apartment buildings, addressed as 508, 512, and 518 West 18th Street and 1715 North Greenwood Street. Oriented to the north (except for 1715 North Greenwood Street, which is oriented to the east), these apartment buildings rest on concrete foundations. A red-brick veneer clads the exterior walls. Windows are generally 2 (horizontal)-over-2 (horizontal)-light, double-hung sash, with white painted wood frames and brick sills. Many have greenpainted, wood-frame screens. The windows at the ends of the symmetrical front façades feature green-painted, paneled shutters with pine-tree-shaped voids. Concentrated at the center of the facades are tripartite picture windows, with flanking sashes. An oculus window opens in the center of the second stories. The principal doorways open in the center of the facades. Single-step concrete stoops, with flanking, wrought-iron railings, approach the doorways, which are sheltered beneath hipped roof metal hoods, on wrought-iron brackets. The doorways host white-painted, 3-light, wood slab doors, opening behind white, vinyl-frame storm doors. Flanking the doors on either side are 1-light sidelights. Other doorways open in the center of the rear (north) elevations. They host single-light, white-painted wood slab doors, opening behind white, vinyl-frame storm doors. Small, shed-roofed porches shelter the doorways. They have low concrete floors and simple, white-painted, square, wood supports. Opening on either side of the doorways are paired, white-painted milk delivery doors. Gray asphalt shingles cover the hipped main roofs and all other roof surfaces. The small gables host metal, louvered attic vents. White-painted wood fascia and soffit box the eaves.

This property is located on terrain sloping downward from northeast to southwest, with an elevation of around 4,700 feet above mean sea level. The neighborhood features modest and large, one- and two-story houses. Setbacks from West 18th Street are generally the same on this block. This property is situated on the south side of West 18th Street, between North Greenwood Street to the east and 1720 North Elizabeth Street to the west. Separating the street from the sidewalk is a grass strip. A planted-grass yard, with mature landscaping, covers the lot. Behind the buildings, parallel to an east-west-oriented alley, is a macadam and gravel parking lot.

These apartment buildings were constructed in 1951 and originally included 1705 North Greenwood Street as well as a nearly identical complex of apartment buildings in the 500 block of West 19th Street. Verdon L. and Leland S. Johnson acquired this property in 1979. In 1995, the owners were Leland S. and Beatrice L. Johnson, who sold it to the Anderson Johnson Investment Company in 1997. In 2005, the Anderson Johnson Investment Company sold the apartment complex to L&J Properties, LLC, the current owner.

42. Statement of significance:

This property is historically significant under Pueblo Local Landmark criterion 1A for its association with the post-World War II development of the North Side neighborhood, when the first multi-family apartment buildings specifically constructed as apartments appeared. (Before this time, apartments were generally converted single-family homes or duplexes.) As well, the apartments are architecturally significant under National Register criterion C (Pueblo Local Landmark criterion 2A) as an intact example of the Colonial Revival style. However, the historical and architectural significance is not to the extent that this property would qualify for individual listing in the National Register of Historic Places, the Colorado State Register of Historic Properties, or as a City of Pueblo Landmark. Nonetheless, it is most likely a contributing resource within any potential historic district.

43. Assessment of historic physical integrity related to significance:

Constructed in 1951, these apartment buildings exhibit a high level of physical integrity relative to the seven aspects of integrity as defined by the National Park Service and the Colorado Historical Society: location, setting, design, materials, workmanship, feeling, and association. They have not been notably altered since their construction. This property retains sufficient physical integrity to convey its architectural and historical significance.

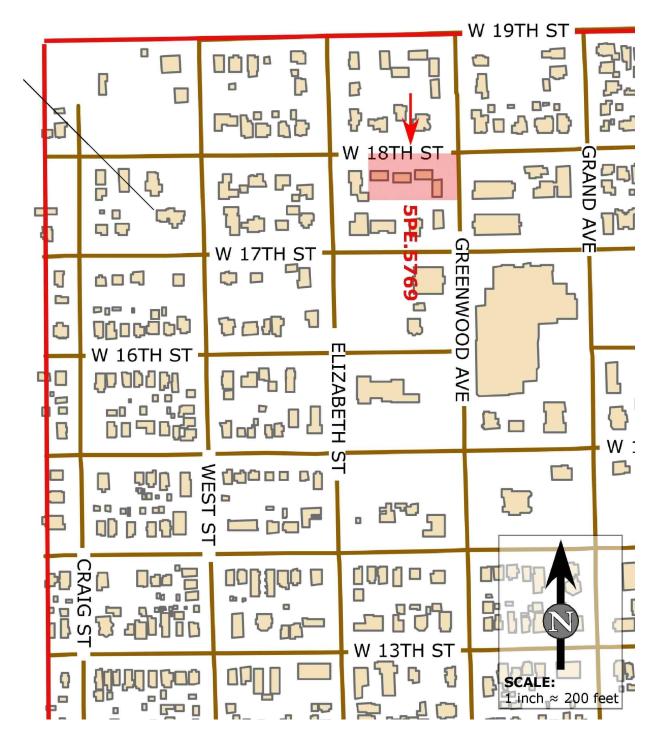

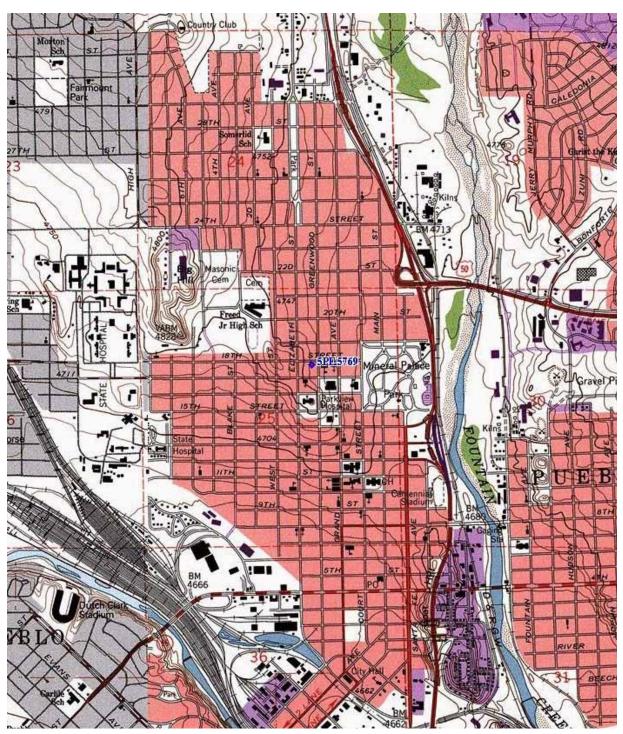
#### SITE SKETCH MAP
